What is Title I?

- Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- > The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for every child.
- The funds are given to the Local Education Agency (LEA), which is the District, to be dispersed to the schools.
- Osceola High School is a Title I school because more than 70% of the students meet poverty requirements.







How do we use our Title I funds?

- Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to <u>supplement</u> the school's existing programs. At our school we are using Title I funds to:
- Increase student achievement
- Add academic coaches to our staff
- Add paraprofessionals to assist your children
- Purchase classroom materials and supplies
- Provide tutoring
- Offer extra professional development for our teachers
- Purchase software and technology equipment
- Conduct parental Informational
 - meetings/trainings/activities



What is the 1% set-aside and how are parents involved?

The Title 1 Allocation for The School District of Osceola County for 2022-2023 is \$17,873,734.92. The law states we have to set aside 1% for parental involvement.

>90% of the 1% amount must be allocated to all Title I schools in the District to implement school-level parental involvement. Our school received \$ 6,762.14.

➤The School District of Osceola County, will use the remaining 10% for family engagement, as well as parent events and training.

➢You, as Title I parents, have the right and are encouraged to be involved in how this money is spent at the LEA and school level.

How do I request the qualifications of my child's teachers?

>As Title I Parents, you, have the right to request the qualifications of your child's teachers.

➤To request qualifications

- Request, in writing, from the principal
- Access the information at http://www.fldoe.org/edcert/public.asp
- Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) four week notice
 - Our school presently has 180 of state certified teachers
 - 33 teachers who are teaching "out of field"
 - Information sent home twice a year





What are my rights as a Title I Parent?

Have an opportunity to schedule regular meetings to make suggestions and participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to your child's education >You can expect a response to any suggestions in a timely manner. Submit comments on the school-wide plan as soon as it is made available to the LEA, if the plan is not satisfactory to you \triangleright Be involved in how this money is spent at the LEA and school level. > Be involved in the development of the LEA Title I Plan > Be involved in the development and review of the School and District **Parent and Family Engagement Plans.** \triangleright Be involved in the development of the school-parent compact. \triangleright Be involved in the development of the school improvement plan. ➢ Request the qualifications of your child's teachers.
