Throughout the school year, our focus in the Osceola School District remains constant. We believe in each and every student, and we aim to show it by providing our best efforts to our entire student population of more than 70,000 children every day. We will continue to place a priority on providing safe and caring learning environments to foster the physical and mental well-being of our students.

To that end, recent legislation requires all Florida school districts to provide Substance Use and Abuse Prevention Education and Child Trafficking Prevention Education for students in Grades K-5. In order to accomplish this, our school counselors will be going into classes and delivering the following age-appropriate curriculum for students:

- *The Too Good for Drugs* curriculum empowers children with the social emotional learning and substance abuse prevention skills they need to lead happy and healthy lives. It will be offered to our students as the Substance Use and Abuse Prevention Education piece.
- *Safer, Smarter Kids and Child Safety Matters* are abuse prevention education curriculums designed for elementary-aged children, which use developmentally appropriate information to arm children with the tools and language they need to protect themselves from abuse. Elementary schools have been using Safer, Smarter Kids or Child Safety Matters to build a foundation for our kindergartners in the past. They will continue to build on that foundation by continuing age-appropriate lessons through fifth grade.

The lessons will be taught now through the end of the school year, and you can contact your school counselor for dates for specific grades or for more information. Counselors, School Social Workers, and School Psychologists will all be available if your child has concerns or questions and will be supporting the work being done in the classrooms.
