Meeting the Evolving Needs of Students and Educators

With input from educators and students, College Board is adapting the SAT® Suite of Assessments (SAT, PSAT/NMSQT®, PSAT™ 10, PSAT™ 8/9) to ensure we continue to meet their evolving needs. We're not simply creating a digital version of the current paper and pencil test – we're taking full advantage of what delivering an assessment digitally makes possible. The digital SAT Suite will provide a better, more flexible test that's easier to take, easier to give, more secure, and more relevant.

The digital SAT will allow every student—regardless of where they go to high school—to access opportunities and scholarships. While the SAT is largely optional for college admissions, we want it to be the best possible option for students to show their strengths.

When Will Students Take the Digital Tests?

We will administer the SAT digitally at international test centers beginning in spring of 2023 and at U.S. schools and test centers beginning in spring of 2024.



What's Staying the Same?

- The SAT Suite will continue to measure the knowledge and skills that students are learning in high school and that matter most for college and career readiness.
- The SAT will still be scored on a 1600 scale and educators and students can continue to track growth across the Suite over time.
- The digital SAT will still be administered in a school or in a test center with a proctor present—not at home.
- Students will still have free, world-class practice resources on Khan Academy®.
- Students will continue to connect directly to scholarships.
- We'll continue to support all students, including those who need accommodations.

What's Changing?

- The tests will be shorter—about two hours instead of three and students will have more time per question.
- Students and educators will receive scores faster.
- Students will take the digital SAT Suite using Bluebook[™], College Board's custombuilt digital exam application. The app includes a built-in graphing calculator, a countdown clock, and a way to flag questions to come back to them later.
- The digital SAT Suite score reports will connect students to information about local two-year colleges, workforce training programs, and career options.
- Students can test on devices they're familiar with, including their own laptops (Windows or MacOS), iPads, school-owned desktops and laptops, or schoolmanaged Chromebooks. If students don't have a device, and are taking the SAT at a weekend test center, we'll provide one to use on test day.
- A digital SAT will be more secure and flexible. Each student gets a unique test form, and states, districts, and schools will have more flexibility for where, when, and how often they administer the SAT.
