Freshmen Year

Academics:

- AP World History or AP Human Geography
- Honors math, science, ELA
- Foreign language (you must have a minimum of 2 years of the **same** language, preferable 3-4 before you graduate for admission to 4-year colleges)
- Start your CTE pathway, ROTC, PE, AVID, and/or electives in the arts

Co-Curriculars:

• Explore clubs and sports that interest you. Don't be afraid to put yourself out there! Now is the time to try new things and learn more about what you like and don't like.

• College Prep:

Use Xello to start researching colleges, careers, and majors of interest







Academics:

- AP science, math, ELA, history, and/or elective classes continue to tailor this to YOU!
- Continue with same foreign language
- AP Seminar (class of 2025 and 2026 only)
- Continue with your CTE pathway, ROTC, AVID, and/or electives in the arts

Co-Curriculars:

- Explore community service opportunities 100 hours minimum for high school career
- Start narrowing down and consistently engaging in activities you enjoy
- Take on leadership tasks and roles when possible

College Prep:

- ACT/SAT prep
- Tour colleges you are most interested in
- Continue to use Xello to research colleges, careers, and majors of interest

Junior Year

Academics:

- AP science, math, ELA, history, and/or elective classes continue to tailor your AP classes to your interests and goals
- Foreign language if completing 3-4 years
- AP Seminar (class of 2023 only)
- Continue with your CTE pathway, ROTC, AVID, and/or electives in the arts
- Co-Curriculars: This is the last full school year to show colleges what you're made of!
 - Think about the differences you want to make in your community and work toward making it happen! What are you accomplishing and learning beyond the titles?
 - Wrap up community service hours and experiences you want on your college application
 - Maintain leadership roles in your clubs and sports
 - Part-time work

College Prep:

- ACT/SAT prep start taking spring of your junior year
- Tour colleges you are most interested in
- Continue to use Xello to research colleges, careers, and majors of interest you should have a good idea of about 5 schools you're interested in and what their admission requirements are

Senior Year



- College applications open in July following your senior year!
- Academics: YOU STILL NEED A FULL, RIGOROUS COURSE LOAD YOUR SENIOR YEAR.
 - AP science, math, ELA, history, and/or elective classes continue to tailor your AP classes to your interests and goals
 - AP Research
 - Foreign language if completing 3-4 years

- Submit all college applications by October
- Complete FAFSA in October
