Approximately 3.5 million children are enrolled in kindergarten in the United States every year. Kindergarten is a German word that literally means children's garden. German educator, Friedrich Fröbel, founded the first play and activity institute in 1837 in Bad Blankeburg, Germany. Fröbel believed that young children should follow their own interests and explore them.

In Florida, children that are 5 years of age by September 1st are eligible to begin their public education in Kindergarten. Visit

It is a lifelong condition and is very common. ASD affects all nationalities, all races and both sexes, although boys are diagnosed at a higher rate than girls.
