Bridging the Gap One Community Conversation at a Time

In the spirit of transparency, inclusion and sound governance, The School District of Osceola County, FL has partnered with the Alliance for Public Schools to implement new parent and community outreach activities in order to elevate stakeholders' voices and engagement with the district. It is the district's belief that everyone shares the responsibility of ensuring that all children have an opportunity to achieve their dreams. Below are two initiatives that have taken place to-date.

Community Conversations – In January and February of 2021, a total of 5 district meetings were held to determine the needs, assets, hopes and expectations of families and the community. Survey links were shared and over 2,800 stakeholders provided valuable feedback that will guide a portion of the work to be done in the years to come.

Student Alliance – The Osceola County School for the Arts and Liberty High School were selected to pilot the Student Alliance at their schools. Student leaders participated in meetings during the school year to openly discuss their needs and hopes for their schools. During their summer break, these students participated in a two-day summer conference where they engaged in activities to help them further assess the needs of their schools by analyzing their school's Panorama survey data.

Attendance Matters

Regular attendance will help set your child up for long-term academic success. Studies show that children that miss 10 percent (18 days) of excused or non-excused days during the school year are likely to fall behind and struggle throughout elementary school. During the middle school years, these absences have been linked to course failure and even dropping out at the high school level. Below are some tips to promote good attendance at home.

Elementary School

- Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Don't let your child stay home unless they are sick. Keep in mind complaints of stomachache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in season.

Middle School and High School

- Communicate with the school and your teen's teachers and let them know how to reach you.
- Activate your parent portal and access your teen's class schedule.
- Check your teen's attendance regularly to make sure they are attending all of their classes.
- Ask for help when you need it.

Good attendance helps to build a solid foundation for children to do well in school, college and work.
