| What will be expected of me on the job?                   | You will be expected to be productive starting the first day, competing small tasks anyone in your field should be able to handle. Then you will move on to more complex tasks each day after that.  | Before being assigned actual tasks, you will be given several days of a light schedule to learn about the company and the work you will do.   |
| What training will I receive?                             | Learn-as-you-go training is the most common, often with a supervisor or experienced coworker guiding you as time allows from the other person's schedule.  | The company will provide several days of targeted training that explains your work in great detail. (A few companies still follow this pattern, but intense training is mostly a thing of the past, especially in smaller companies.) |
| What about my expectations for the company that hires me? | Within limits, companies will consider your individual wishes, but you will need to adjust your expectations to fit the company's goals or take a job with a different company.  | Companies realize that expectations of young workers today may be different from those of prior generations. They change their policies to accommodate younger workers.   |
| What skills and abilities are most important?             | Research by Harvard University, Carnegie Foundation, and Stanford University concluded that <b>85%</b> of job success comes from strong soft skills, and only <b>15%</b> of job success comes from technical skills and knowledge, known as "hard skills." | Exceptional skills in accounting, engineering, carpentry, the technologies and other fields are what get you hired, keep you employed, and gain you promotions. These skills are more important than the soft skills.                 |
